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#### **Final Minutes for Public Meeting**

#### CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

Mr. LeHew called the meeting to order at 9:16 a.m. and conducted a roll call. The following Board members were present: Mike LeHew, Lisa Wynn (alternate member for the Department of Health Services), Alvin Vasicek, Rachell Tucker, and Arthur W. Baker. There were no board members absent.

#### CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Mr. LeHew made a call to the public. There were no members of the public present.

#### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mr. Vasicek made a motion to approve the minutes from the Board's May 19, 2006, meeting, and Mr. Baker seconded. The motion passed, 5-0.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Mr. Seavers referred the Board members to his report on the revenue and expenditures for fiscal year ("FY") 2006. (See Attachment 1.) Mr. Seavers also referred Board members to his report on the Board's strategic plan for FY 2006. (See Attachment 2.)

#### FISCAL YEAR 2007 BUDGET

Mr. Seavers referred Board members to the proposed FY 2007 budget and accompanying memorandum. (See Attachment 3.) Mr. Seavers explained that the proposal to hire a hearing officer was in response to the increasing caseload and his own inability to keep up with the Board's current caseload.

Ms. Wynn asked Mr. Seavers whether he had a specific location in mind for the new Board office. Mr. Seavers said he did not. Ms. Tucker asked what the basis was for the budgeted rent. Mr. Seavers responded that the estimate was admittedly rough but was based on cost data that the Department of Administration had provided the previous fiscal year.

Mr. LeHew asked whether revenues would decline because of the shift from three-year to six-year fingerprint clearance cards. Mr. Seavers said that he did not believe there would be a significant decline, given that there is high turnover in the regulated professions.

Ms. Wynn asked whether the new hearing officer position would be covered under the merit system. Mr. Seavers said he believed the position would be uncovered. Ms. Tucker and Mr. Baker indicated that they would want sufficient operational measures in place to ensure that conflicts of interest would not arise from the hearing officer covering some of the investigator's excess work. Mr. Seavers replied that in cases where the hearing officer conducted the investigation for an expedited review, he or she would not conduct the administrative hearing. Mr. Baker stressed the importance of eliminating the possibility of a conflict of interest.

Mr. Vasicek made a motion to approve the proposed budget for FY 2007, and Mr. Baker seconded. The motion passed, 5-0.

#### FISCAL YEAR 2007 STRATEGIC PLAN

Mr. Seavers referred the Board members to his report on the Board's strategic plan for FYs 2007 and 2008. (See Attachment 2.) Mr. Seavers noted that he added some measures in order to reflect changes to the Board's business process and to collect information on the length of time from the administrative hearing to the Board's final decision on a good cause exception application.

#### **DRAFT RULES**

Mr. Seavers referred the Board members to the two sets of draft, proposed rules. (See Attachment 4.) Mr. Seavers explained that a rule on rehearing or review is required by law, so the rule proposal is meant to comply with the law. The draft rule on *ex parte* communication is meant to protect Board members and applicants from conflicts of interest, to preserve objectivity, and to ensure that the administrative record would include any contact outside of the standard application process and any administrative hearing.

Mr. Seavers explained that he was presenting the draft rule proposals to the Board members so that they could get feedback from appropriate stakeholders before formally proposing the rules and initiating the rulemaking process.

Mr. Vasicek asked about the draft rule on rehearing or review, section (A)(3). He asked who would make the determination on whether the evidence was "newly discovered." Mr. Seavers replied that the Board would make that finding.

Mr. LeHew requested that the Board members review the draft rules and consult with stakeholders for discussion at a future meeting.

#### **CHAIR'S REPORT**

Mr. LeHew referred the Board members to the draft legislative proposals that appear in Attachment 5 of the minutes. He explained that some of the draft proposals had been developed the previous year following a series of meetings between representatives of the primary agencies that participate in the fingerprint clearance card system. He also explained that the proposal regarding time limits might be advanced by the Department of Public Safety ("DPS"), although DPS had not decisively indicated whether it would propose the legislation.

Mr. LeHew asked the Board members to consult with their respective agencies on the draft legislative proposals for discussion and action at a future Board meeting.

#### **ELECTIONS**

Mr. Vasicek made a motion to elect Mr. LeHew for the position of Board chair, and Mr. Baker seconded. The motion passed, 5-0.

Ms. Wynn made a motion to elect Ms. Pipersburgh for the position of Board vice chair, and Mr. Vasicek seconded, pending Ms. Pipersburgh's acceptance. The motion passed, 5-0.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

Mr. Baker made a motion to adjourn the meeting, and Mr. Vasicek seconded. passed, 5-0. Mr. LeHew adjourned the meeting at 10:26 a.m.	The motion

SUBJECT: FY 2007 Budget Issues

Along with the notice for the Board's Augusto, 2006, reeting, I provided a proposed budget for fiscal year 2007. The budget would increaseed ditures by 36%. This ermo describes and attempts to justify the proposed increase irespling. In addition, the ermo identifies the rajor assumptions that underlie the budget proposal.

Although the budget proposes a **stabs** in crease in spending, the Board's revenues would be greater than expenditures, **athe** Board of Fingerprinting Fundould have a net increase of \$12,043.32 (fron\$561,750.30 to \$573,793.62).

#### THREE MAJOR AREAS OF INCREASED SPENDING

There are three areas in the buddent comprise the bulk of the proposed spending increases. One area in particular – a property hire a new eprloyee – ha policy implications that the Board may wish to consider when detain whether to adopt the proposed budget.

1. New office location. The budget includes estated cost for a new office location. The Board's current lease paires at the end of this dendar year. At that tien, the Board could move to a new location that any be more suitable for its operations. Currently, the Board relies on other agencies for space of the arings. If though these agencies have been generous in offering space fertilearings, there are advantages to conducting hearings on site: (1) on-side ariengs would be easier to be advantaged to conducting hearings on site: (1) on-side ariengs would be easier to be a proble of occasions and that can be a proble afternotices of hearing and be not a uple of occasions and that can be a proble afternotices of hearing are been relied to applicants and (3) the dain on personnel resources would be immized, since all employees would remain on site. In addition, the work of the executive director and investigator is easier to condition an enclosed office space refer than a cubicle. The increased costs appear under proofiler object code 7221 ("Rental of Land and Buildings") and apply only to the thirm of the fourth quarters of the fiscal year.

- 2. One-time IT costs. Upgrades to the Board's databavould improve case tracking and management. These upgrades would reflect changes to the law and changes that the Board has made to its operations in the past few years. The estimate in the proposed budget would probably be higher than the actual costs. These costs appear under comptroller object code 6299 ("Other Profession Outside Services"). Later in the year, the executive director may proposed based initiatives, such as making case information available to Board members other Internet. However, these initiatives would be proposed separately asitiadas to the current proposed budget.
- 3. Additional FTE. The budget proposal assumes **tha**tcurrent four-member staff (including the administrative assistant piositthat Rosie Bayardo recently vacated) would be supplemented by an additional FTIEnis position would have two primary responsibilities: (1) sharing the earing officer caseload withe executive director and (2) sharing the caseload of the reviews thatinvestigator conducts preparation for the Board's expedited reviews. The positiwould have a pay and grade between the investigator and the executive director possible position tithe include "Chief Investigator" or "Deputy Diector." The proposed budget assumes a salary of \$43,000, which falls between the investigator same of \$40,458.70 and the executive director's salary of \$49,046.40. The variable employeeted expenditures assisted with this salary, particularly the Board's costs for bitis eassume that the employee selected the benefits plans most costly to the Board (e.g., the family PPO health¹ plan).

#### **BUDGET ASSUMPTIONS**

The following assumptions are incorporated into the budget proposal.

- 1. Revenue. The Department of Public Safetyl receive 120,000 applications for a fingerprint clearance card. This numberuld generate fee-based revenues of \$360,000 for the Board. The figure of 120,000 applications conservatively supposes that number of fingerprint clearance card applications withmain about the same as fiscal year 2006. Historically, DPS has had substantial increaseach year in the number of fingerprint clearance card applications. It is likely thatere will be more applications than this budget assumes.
- 2. Performance pay. The budget includes projections for the performance pay authorized by the Legislature in its most recent session. This 2.5% performance pay is guaranteed until April 2007, at which time the pay would be if certain performance measures are met. This budget assumes that the performance measures will be met for each time period.
- 3. Non-capital equipment costs. The budget assumes constitution and additional computer and related software for an additional FTE. (See above for a discussion of the additional FTE.)

- 4. Risk management costs.DPS pays for the Board's risk management costs, and the Board reimburses DPS. These costs appetancifirst quarter undecomptroller object code 9101 ("Operating Transfe@ut") and amount to \$4,004.
- 5. Office of Administrative Hearings. The budget assumes that the Board will send more hearings to the Office of Administrative Hearings than in the past and that the Board will not receive credits (as it has in the past) netend of the fiscal year for referring fewer hearings to OAH than anticipated. If the Bo were to hire an additional FTE, as described above, the Board may stop using OAH altogether by the third or fourth quarter.

#### Draft rule on rehearing or review of decision or order

- A. An appellant may seek a review or **eahing** of a Board decisin that results from an administrative hearing by submitting a written request for a review or rehearing to the Board within 30 days from the date of see/of the decision. The Board shall grant a request for review or rehear for any of the following reasons materially affecting the rights of the appellant:
  - 1. The findings of fact, conclusions law, order, or decision are not supported by the evidence arme contrary to law;
  - 2. The appellant was deprived of **a factorise** from the proceedings, abuse of discretion **nois** conduct of the hearing officer;
  - 3. Newly discovered material evidence is that could have a bearing on the decision and that, with reasonable diligence, could not have been discovered and produced earlier; or
  - 4. Error in admission or rejection of evidence, or other errors of law occurring at the hearing.
- B. The request shall specify the grounds for eview or rehearing and shall provide reasonable evidence that the appellarity is were materially affected.
- C. The Board may grant a rehearing or reviewany of the reasons in subsection A. The Board or its hearing officer may take additional testimony, amend findings of fact and conclusions of law, or make new findings and conclusions, and affirm, modify, or reverse the original decision.
- D. A rehearing or review, interesting the same of the issue upon which the decision is found erroneous. Of the granting or design a rehearing or review shall specify the basis for the order.

#### Draft rule on ex partecommunication

- A. In any good cause exception case, except to the extent required for disposition of ex partematters as authorized by law these rules of procedure:
  - 1. No interested person outside the Bobshall make or knowingly cause to be made to any Board members, heganificer, administrative law judge, or other employee or consultant who is measurements on the decisional process of the proceeding papartecommunication relevant to the merits of the proceeding;

  - 1. All such written communications;
  - 2. Memoranda stating the substancalbsuch oral communications; and
  - 3. All written responses, and memoranda stating the substance of all oral responses, to the communications descriin paragraphs 1 and 2 of this subsection.
- C. Upon receipt of a communication made or knowingly caused to be made by a party in violation of this section, the Board or its hearingceffi to the extent consistent with the interests of juste and the policy of the underthe statutes and rules, may require the party to show cause why his or the or interest in the proceeding should not be dismissed, denied, disregarded, or otherwise adversely affected on account of such violation.
- D. The provisions of this section shapply beginning at the time in which the request for a good cause exception in accordance with R13-11-103.
- E. For purposes of this section:

- 1. "Person outside the Board" means any person other than a Board member, and employee or consultant of the Boardany attorney representing the Board in its adjudicatory role.
- 2. "Ex partecommunication" means an oral written communication not on the administrative record and not thus ject of reasonable prior notice to all parties.

#### Note:

In looking at the current crimes list, the departments (DHS, DES, AOC, ADE and DJC) tried to reflect the current trends in law endement, societal change offenses that may have been overlooked and offens that DPS has seen an ename in over the past several years. There were no preconceived ideas and hich offenses would be reviewed. The departments could bring up and fense they felt needed to be dressed which could mean that we could have taken offenses of the list just as well as adding offenses.

The group also tried on two separate occasions to address sames. The group felt that there was merit in assigning or adsisting timeframes but could not get a total commitment to the conceptrom all of the departments on how to administer the timeframes and on which crimes. The ADE feltithimeframes should not be considered. The Arizona Board of Fingerprinting (BOF) offeel to address the timeframe issue within the BOF rules. But, as the ADE pointed other BOF is obligated by statute to consider certain factors before approving or denying a good cause exception. In addition, the DJC felt that a card should only be denied if the was a felony conviction and that it did not seem to be in the best interest of the strathold minor offenses that are 5, 10 and 15 years old against someone.

Also, the departments briefly iscussed that everyone within the clearance card system have a CPS and APS check controlled before their employment.

The lists of offenses listed on page 1 areommendations from representatives of the 5 departments plus input from the DPS and the BOF. Also departments felt that timeframes could be a viable asset if with a sthoroughly researched and implemented correctly plus having all of the departments buy into the idea.

In closing, I would like to thank everyone how participated in this process and hope that we can continue to improve and enhance how there are card system works.
